foundation of her layered Charlotte, North Carolina, shop, Dressing Rooms Interiors Studio, which stocks an ever-evolving assortment of vintage and new home wares. But it also rings true in the colorful, art-filled home she shares with her husband (and dog).

Bethea's methodology is simple: "I only buy things that I love, whether for my house or the store. It's not necessarily what's on trend at the time; if I love it, I'm gonna purchase it." The result is a delightfully eclectic mix—some of the motifs and styles Bethea gravitates toward are animals, crown molding, layered textures, and 1970s art.

And while her current profession requires regular treasure hunting, Bethea's love of collecting dates back to childhood. Her parents and grandparents each had a discerning eye. At home, Bethea mixes her own finds with their family heirlooms: a 1960s Milo Baughman sofa (in its original upholstery!) that her mother purchased on layaway, a metal dining set of her grandparents' that Bethea revived with fabric remnants. Finding this mix comes naturally: "That's just how I grew up," she recalls. "We had masks, we had midcentury art, Asian art, African art, and abstract art, and it was all mixed together."

Setting the backdrop to Bethea's collection is an array of rich jewel tones, as well as detailed fixtures and molding—despite the home being a (now 15-year-old) new build. Her admiration for such ornate architectural details comes from the seven years she spent living in Boston, where she fell in love with historic New England homes. "I added that heavy molding wherever I could," she says. "Double molding, double crown—I fell in love with that style."

In Bethea's hands, these traditional accents are anything but stuffy; instead, they provide a supporting framework for a perfectly personal home that, as Bethea says, "fits how we live and showcases the things that are important to us as a family."



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


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
